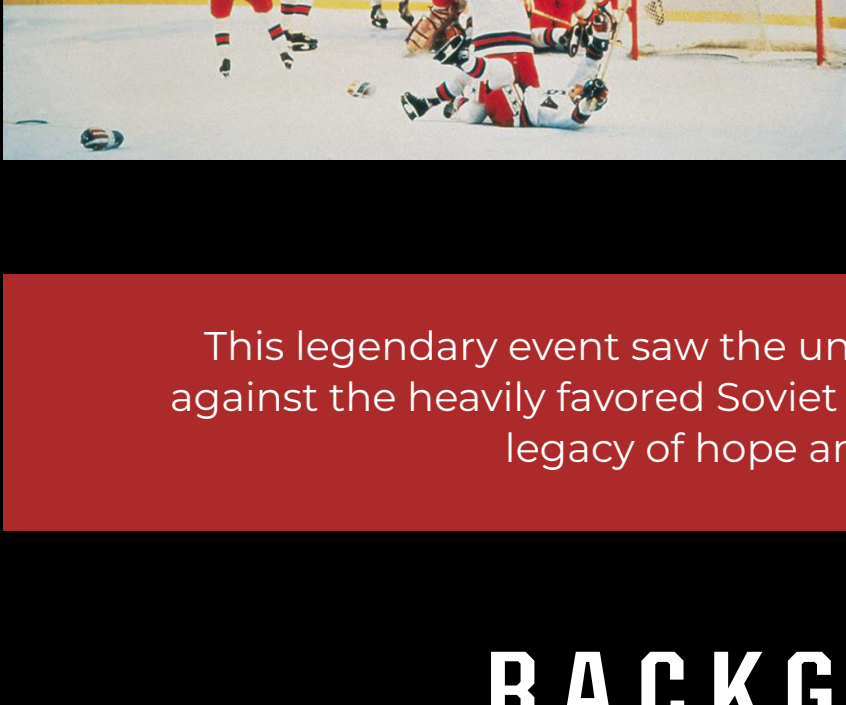


THE MIRACLE ON ICE

AN UNFORGETTABLE AMERICAN VICTORY

INTRODUCTION

The game took place on February 22, 1980, at the Olympic Center in Lake Placid, New York.

The Americans quickly responded with a goal by Buzz Schneider, but the Soviets regained the lead with a goal by Sergei Makarov.



In the final seconds of the period, Mark Johnson scored for the US, tying the game at

with Alexander Maltsev scoring to bring the score to


3-2

The third period was where the "miracle" truly unfolded.




Mark Johnson scored his second goal of the game, tying the score at

Just minutes later, captain Mike Eruzione scored the go-ahead goal, giving the US a

4-3 lead



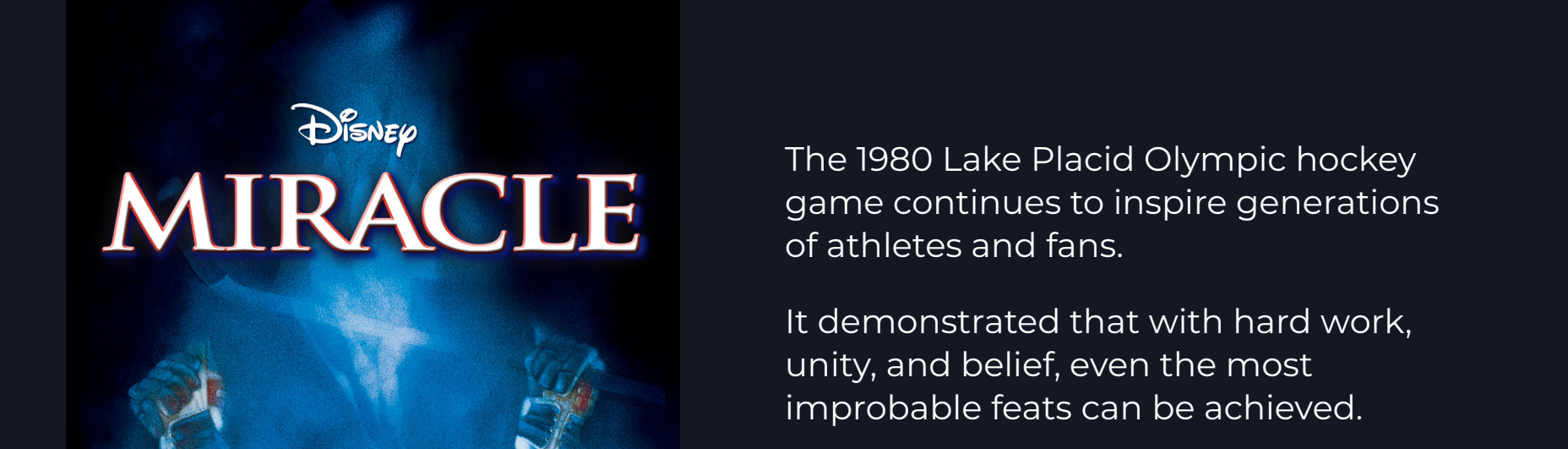
The final ten minutes of the game were marked by intense defensive efforts from the American team, who managed to fend off the relentless Soviet attacks.

"USA! USA!"

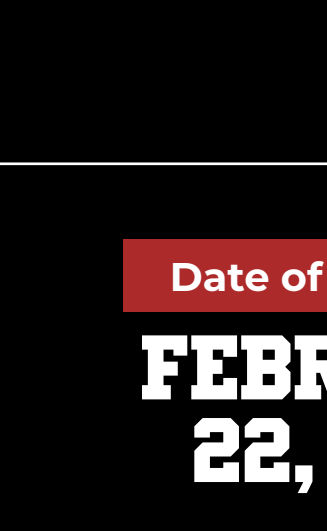
and Al Michaels famously exclaimed,

AFTERMATH

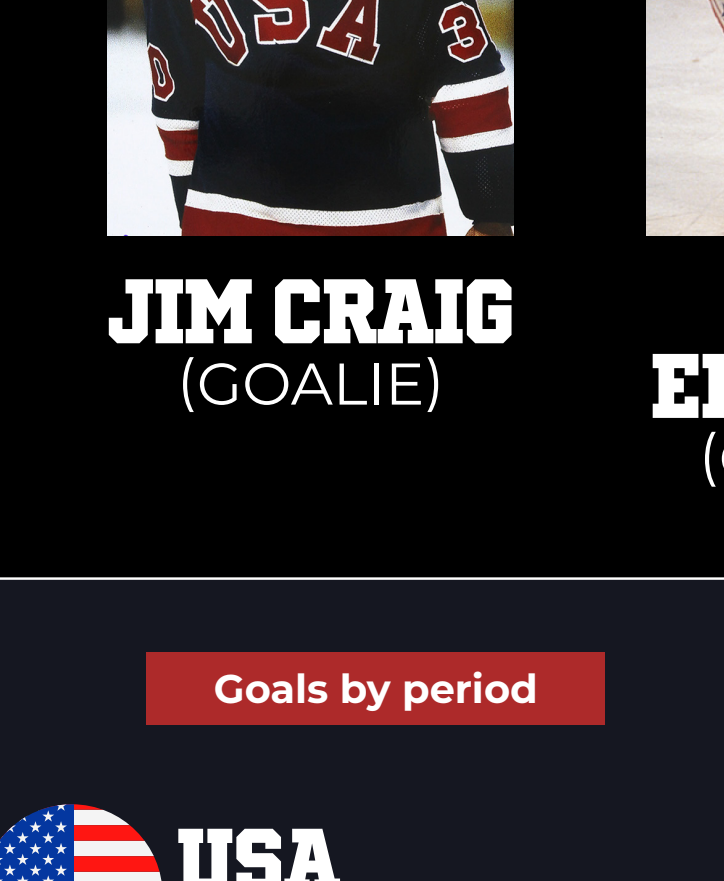
The victory against the Soviet Union propelled the American team to the gold medal game, where they faced Finland.


